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#### **Letter from the President**

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ur mission at SUNY Brockport is to be an inclusive learning community that inspires excellence through growth, engagement, and transformation. Our vision is to build meaningful lives and vibrant communities, and we do this through a focus on the four goals of Building a Better

Brockport: To be a Great College at which to Learn; To be a College Engaged with its Community; To be a Sustainable and Thriving College for the 21st Century; and to be a Great College at which to Work. We also show our commitment to our students and our community through

our Brockport Promise and our Better Community Statement, both of which guide our actions on a daily basis.

As is reflected in this report, during the 2021-22 academic year, we continued to adjust to living in a pandemic world. Yet at the same time, we continued our focus on Building a Better Brockport. This isn't just the name of our newly revised strategic plan: it's what we do. It is important, even as we face difficulties, to celebrate the successes we have achieved, whether individually or collectively. In a document such as this, it is

To be a Great College at which to Work, we will launch and review a Campus Climate Survey designed to help us understand how better to support our employees and students.

This is just a small portion of what we will focus on in 2022-23. I am honored to serve as president of this remarkable college, and I look forward to seeing what we can achieve together, as we truly Build a Better Brockport.



SUNY Brockport is proud to announce that the Middle States Commission on Higher Education has reaffirmed the College's accreditation for the next eight years. The Commission praised the College's campus-wide diversity and inclusion efforts, our comprehensive communication and engagement activities in relation to institutional planning and fiscal responsibility, and our robust shared governance practices.

#### **SUNY Brockport Rises 10 Spots** in 2022 US News & World Report Rankings

SUNY Brockport has again been recognized for excellence by U.S. News & World Report. Brockport ranked No. 73 among regional universities in the north in the publication's 2022 Best Colleges rankings, which were released Sept. 13, 2021. Brockport jumped 10 spots from its ranking a year ago.

#### **Academic Strategic Planning Work Completed**

The Division of Academic Affairs completed its Academic Strategic Plan, which included a comprehensive review of academic programs at both the undergraduate and graduate level. Its goal is to set the foundation for increased stability and enrollment. This task began in 2015 and hundreds of individuals helped it come to fruition.

#### **Dr. Tia Brown McNair Facilitates** Student Success Workshop

The Divisions of Enrollment Management and Student Affairs and Academic Affairs participated in a two-day student success workshop facilitated by Dr. Tia Brown McNair. McNair is the Vice President of Diversity, Equity, and Student Success and the Executive Director for the Truth, Racial Healing, and **Transformation Campus Centers** at the American Association of

Colleges & Universities. She discussed best practices related to inclusive excellence, equity-minded data analysis, and student success outcomes.

#### **Theatre Production Receives** the Kennedy Center Citizen **Artist Award**

The Department of Theatre and Music Studies Fall 2021 production of "Water by the Spoonful" received a Kennedy Center Citizen Artist Award at the 2022 Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival (KCACTF) national awards ceremony on May 21, 2022. Directed by SUNY Brockport alumna Stephanie Paredes and produced by the Department of Theatre and Music Studies in collaboration with the Rochester Latino Theatre Company "Water by the Spoonful" is one of 22 productions from the eight KCACTF regions to be honored in the live-streamed awards ceremony. Guest projection designer, Dan Roach, received a Special Achievement in Projection Design award at the ceremony as well.

## **Brockport Students Win SUNYMathics Competition**

Congratulations to three SUNY Brockport students who won top places in the 2022 SUNYMathics competition. Nathaniel Paddock took first place in the competition, Matthew Too tied for second, and Stacey Do tied for third. This was the first time that a SUNY Brockport student finished in the top spot. The competition took place on April 9, 2022. Participating students had three hours to solve 12 intriguing problems, problems that inspire creative approaches and draw on multiple branches of the discipline. Brockport Professor of Mathematics Gabriel T. Prajitura founded the competition to celebrate mathematical curiosity and promote a culture of creative problem-solving. Associate Professor Hong Yin conducted the 2022 competition at Brockport.

#### Physical Education Student Nationally Honored as "Major of the Year"

Kayli Brown was selected as the physical education Major of the Year during the 2022 Society of Health and Physical Educators conference in New Orleans, LA, which took place April 26-30, 2022. The award celebrates outstanding undergraduate students in the health, physical education, recreation, and dance professions. Kayli was a senior in the Physical Education Teacher Education program and a member of the Honors College.

# Journalism Sophomore Selected as Reporter for Broadcast Education Association

Cambrie Eckert was one of a handful of journalism students nationwide selected to be part of a small team of journalists covering the Broadcast Education Association (BEA) and National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) conferences in Las Vegas, NV from April 22-26, 2022.

Eckert utilized a variety of storytelling methods, including text, audio, video, photos, and graphics. Eckert and the other student multimedia journalists reported on different aspects of media and technology, including interviews with exhibitors, speakers, sponsors, and award winners. She was also awarded a convention registration, housing, a round-trip economy airfare of up to \$500, and a \$250 stipend for food and incidentals.

#### Study Abroad Returns

Spring 2022 marked the return of study abroad programs after being suspended since spring 2020 due to the global pandemic. SUNY Brockport has a strong commitment to global learning and worked diligently to reopen programs abroad safely. The Center for Global Education and Engagement supported Brockport and other SUNY students this spring and summer in Ireland, Italy, Mexico, Spain, and the United Kingdom. Plans are underway to enroll more global opportunities in 2022-2023.



#### **Spotlight on Student Excellence**

## SUNY Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence

The Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence acknowledges students for their integration of academic excellence with other aspects of their lives including leadership, campus involvement, community service, arts (creative or performing), athletics, and/or career achievement. It is the highest honor bestowed upon a student by the University. Students were recognized during a ceremony which took place on April 27, 2022.

Hunter Czajkowski completed a Bachelor of Science in Biochemistry with a 4.0 GPA. She was a member of the Honors College, President of the Rotaract Club, Treasurer of the Pre-Professional Health Club, and a member of the gymnastics/track team. Her hard work and determination resulted in her being on the President's List (Fall 2019-Fall 2020) and on the Dean's list with Honors (Fall 2020 and Spring 2021). She worked as a research assistant with an Orthopedic surgeon at a local hospital for over four years.

Rhonda-Lee Forbes completed a Bachelor of Science in Computer Science with a 3.7 GPA. She was involved in the Brockport Women in Technology Club, Brockport Student Government as a Student Court Justice, and Lead Student Desktop Technician of the IT Service Desk. She earned the Vishal Anand Memorial Scholarship and the Community in Mathematics, Computing Sciences, and Physics Scholars Scholarship. She presented at the National Conference on Undergraduate Research in 2021 and 2022 and was part of the 2021 Summer Undergraduate Research Program.

Matthew Too completed a double major in Biochemistry and Mathematics with a concentration in Statistics, and a double minor in Psychology and Pre-Professional Health, with a 4.0 GPA. His awards include the Honors Scholar Award, American Institute of Chemists' 2022 Baccalaureate Student Award, Eastern Analytical Symposium Student Research Award (2021), 2021 Analytical Chemistry Award, and the 2018-2019 American Chemical Society ACS Organic Chemistry Award. He was awarded the Morris Fellowship for Summer Research in Chemistry to conduct research in Darmstadt, Germany for six weeks in 2019. Too worked as an EOP Peer Tutor for Math, as an ASC math tutor for 15 different math courses, and as an ASC Organic Chemistry I and II tutor.

Too also received the **President's Citation Award**, which recognizes a graduating senior who has

demonstrated outstanding scholastic merit, a strong record of co-curricular activities, significant contributions to the College and community, and evidence of professional promise.

#### **Graduate Distinguished Scholar Award**

This award recognizes an exceptional graduate student with a record of outstanding academic work and scholarship. To be considered for the award, a nominee must be a graduating master's level student with a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.85 and outstanding scholarship or creative activity in their field of study.

Zachary Scott Ayers completed his Master of Arts in Clinical Psychology (with research emphasis), with a 3.94 GPA. During the 2021-22 academic year he was the Lab Coordinator for Dr. Jan Gillespie's Positive Psychology Lab. He was a member of the Brockport Circle of Omicron Delta Kappa and the National Leadership Honor Society, and has been a guest Lecturer in Psychology 424 (Positive Psychology) and Psychology 482 (Community Psychology). His Master's Thesis was on applying the best possible self-exercise to reduce COVID-19 related stress and anxiety. Ayers presented at the McGill Institute for Health and Social Policy 2021 Conference and the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues (Division 9 of the American Psychological Association) 2021 Virtual Conference.

#### **Marion Schrank Student Leadership Award**

This award is the pinnacle of student leadership awards at SUNY Brockport that recognizes an outstanding student who demonstrates scholastic achievement, exemplary leadership, and a commitment to the college through leadership in a student organization and/or student employment.

Tanajah (Tee) Malachi completed a Bachelor of Science in Social Work with a 3.78 GPA. As a student leader on campus, she held many positions that represented her commitment to inclusivity on campus and underrepresented individuals on and off-campus, including Brockport Village Hall Volunteer, Student Health Advocate, Advocacy External Coordinator with Brockport Student Government, and Youth Advocate for the NYS Office of Children and Family Services. Malachi earned several certificates and licenses during her time at Brockport including the Gold and Green Leadership Certificates, CPR and First Aid, and Phi Alpha Honor Society.



#### Lewine Family Global Engagement Fund Created

The Lewine Global Engagement Fund, established in 2021-2022 by alumni Steve Lewine, will be used to enhance SUNY Brockport's efforts to build a generation of leaders and innovators who have a deep understanding of other cultures through international experiences and global engagement. The Lewine Family has committed to a gift of \$300,000 over the next five years. The Fund will support a Global Business Leadership Program, scholarships for study abroad and international students, and an annual faculty and staff award in recognition of emeriti Dr. Victor Rojas and in memory of Dr. Francisco Zayas.

## **COIL Program Provides Global Learning Opportunities**

While the pandemic put a hold on in-person student mobility, Brockport students continued global engagement in the classroom through technology. Nine Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) courses were offered this year and students collaborated on academic projects with peers from the Netherlands, Mexico, France, Ukraine and the United Kingdom. Additionally, students participated in remote internships with organizations in Dublin, Ireland including

BooksGoSocial, MEG Support Tools, and Dyspraxia Association of Ireland.

## Geology Students Present Research in New Orleans

Five geology seniors from the Department of Earth Sciences presented their studies at the American Geophysical Union (AGU) annual meeting in New Orleans, LA, where they interacted with researchers and professionals from all over the world. The AGU meeting is the largest geoscience conference with 25,000+ attendees.

## Computing Sciences at ROC on Tech Conference

Computing Science students, along with Department Chair Dr. Mehruz Kamal, attended the ROC on Tech 2022 conference on April 13, 2022, at the Floreano Riverside Convention Center in Rochester. The conference, for which SUNY Brockport was a sponsor, featured top national expert speakers, including Steve Wozniak, Apple co-founder, as the headline keynote speaker.

#### **Explore Outer Space** from Campus

SUNY Brockport's planetarium in Lemon Hall offers free shows that are open to the community on the first and third Friday of each month during the academic year. A show runs for about 45 minutes and will point out planets and constellations, introduce movements of the sky and current astronomy events, then concludes with a film.

#### **Gift Card Donations Collected for Ukrainian Refugees in Rochester**

The Division of Enrollment Management and Student Affairs collected gift cards to support Ukrainian refugees staying in Henrietta, NY. Many of these families arrived with nothing but the clothes on their back and the SUNY Brockport community came together to help them get settled.

#### Walk!Bike!Brockport!2021 Erie **Canalway Challenge Results**

This year, the Walk!Bike!Brockport! Action Group hosted an inaugural challenge within the Erie Canalway Challenge. Nineteen individuals from the greater Brockport community participated in the challenge over the course of the Erie Canal's open

season. Participants chose their own individualized mileage goal, from one mile, 15 miles, 90 miles, 180 miles, or 360 miles, to cycle, walk, run, roll, and/or paddle along the Canal. All individuals committed and completed miles counted toward the group's collective goals:

- · 3,810 miles collectively committed
- · 3,874.07 miles completed by individuals, surpassing the goal by 64 miles!

Participants who completed their individual goal received a Canalway Challenge Certificate of Recognition and merchandise.

#### **Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra Comes to SUNY Brockport**

Conductor Matthew Kraemer led the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra (RPO) in a free concert of serenades and dances featuring works by Mozart, Handel, Strauss, and more at the Special Events Recreation Center on August 5, 2021. This Summer Serenade was made possible with additional support by the New York State Canal Corporation, The James M. and Olive Edmunds Memorial Fund at Rochester Area Community Foundation, and by the Killian J. and Carolyn F. Schmitt Foundation. This

event was presented collaboratively by the Village of Brockport, SUNY Brockport, and the RPO.

#### Alumni Podcast Takes Flight

The SUNY Brockport Division of Advancement is exploring the world of podcasting with "Where Golden Eagles Soar!" The monthly podcast shares impactful stories from a variety of alumni, and is featured on popular listening platforms. Guests of "Where Golden Eagles Soar!" offer a wide range of careers and life experiences for investigation by co-hosts Michael Doyle '80 and Director of Alumni Engagement Kerry Gotham. Each podcast explores an alum's connection to Brockport before diving into more detail about the keys to their success postgraduation.

#### **International Students Embrace Local Community**

SUNY Brockport hosted international students and visiting scholars from over 20 countries this year. They were actively engaged on campus, but also explored our region participating in cultural programs that took them to local festivals, Letchworth State Park, Niagara Falls, a Rochester Red Wings baseball game, and the George Eastman

#### SUNY Brockport Corporate Challenge Team Completes Competition

On June 14, 2022, the SUNY Brockport Corporate Challenge team, composed of over 40 faculty and staff members, completed the 3.5-mile challenge in downtown Rochester. They joined over 3,000 participants, representing more than 150 companies from the surrounding area. After running or walking the course, the team members enjoyed a casual atmosphere and food and drinks in the Frontier Field stadium followed by fireworks at the end of the evening.

## **Brockport Summer Learning Makes an Impact**

Over 50 students were enrolled the Brockport Summer Learning program, a five-week academic enrichment program offered to Rochester City School District students. The program is grounded in best practices for restorative education, social-emotional learning, culturally responsive and sustaining



# TO BE A SUSTAINABLE AND THRIVING COLLEGE FOR THE 21ST CENTURY

UNY Brockport sees sustainability, long linked with environmental concerns, as also encompassing our fiscal health and viability. Environmental sustainability requires a focus on the health and safety of the environment of our campus as well as the quality of place and accessibility.

#### **Graduate Program Growth**

Graduate enrollments remained strong in 2021-2022 which positively contributed to the financial stability of SUNY Brockport. Center for Graduate Studies personnel assisted with the launch of 4 new graduate programs, and led and supported initiatives to grow new graduate student enrollments and continuing student retention numbers.

#### A Challenge to Walk, Bike, **Carpool to School on Earth Day**

On April 22, 2022, the campus community celebrated Earth Day by participating in a challenge to shrink our carbon footprint. This challenge was orchestrated by students in **Environmental Science and included** an Instagram takeover of the SUNY Brockport account. Participants were encouraged to join the challenge and post on social media using hashtags: #brockportwalks, #brockportbikes, #brockportearthday.

#### **Working to Conserve Energy**

The campus Energy Management Program and National Grid have partnered on 23 energy reducing projects over the last six years, resulting in an annual CO2 emissions savings of 1,527 tons. This partnership has also resulted in an annual savings of approximately \$185,000 from an annual reduction of 2,775.787 KWH

of electrical use. A few examples of future projects that are planned include the continued conversion of lighting to LED, installation of energy efficient motors that drive our heating/cooling system pumps, and enhanced technology to collect data and assist us in earlier interventions with climate control issues.

#### Recycling, not Landfill

SUNY Brockport's long-standing recycling program is fully integrated into our daily operations. Facilities Maintenance and Operations provides recycling bins for offices, classrooms, and other interior public areas. The College produces about 74 tons of recyclable materials and 40 tons of scrap metal annually. Other examples of our recycling efforts include separate waste streams for electronics, batteries, motor oil, and fluorescent bulbs (most have now been converted to LED). Even the mattresses rotated out of the residential buildings are recycled.

#### **Tree Replacement**

SUNY Brockport aims to plant three trees for every tree removed, understanding that the location of the replacement tree(s) may not always be in the same location as the tree removed. Attention to the proper selection, planting, and maintenance of new trees is pursued to achieve long-term risk reduction. Pruning is

conducted on an as-needed basis. Also, every spring the Grounds Team participates in the Village of Brockport Arbor Day activities — contributing both labor and equipment to plant trees around the village. SUNY Brockport has an aspirational goal of maintaining a zero net loss of tree canopy on our campus through the preservation of existing trees and new tree plantings. The total area of the main campus is 496.2 acres. The main uses of our land breaks down as follows (given in acres):

- Grass = 210.1
- Forest = 163.4
- Urban = 82.8
- Wetland = 33.7
- Water = 6.1

All construction/renovation projects are carefully reviewed in the planning and design process to consider potential impacts on existing trees, damage prevention and/or mitigation approaches, or the necessity of tree removal and replacement.

#### **New Meadow to Enhance Campus Sustainability**

Five acres of a grassy hilled lot near Redman Road, across from Parking Lot X, has been restored to meadows. The lot have been planted with a variety of native plants, wild grasses, and flowers, creating habitats for pollinators such as bees, birds, and butterflies. Additionally, a woodchip path was installed to benefit Brockport's cross-country team and the Department of Environmental Science and Ecology, which already uses the adjacent woods during labs.

#### **Housekeeping Staff Cares for** Over 1,768,000 Square Feet of **Space Every Day**

Facilities Maintenance and Operations' housekeeping staff currently consists of 73 team members who are dedicated to providing a clean and comfortable environment for the entire SUNY **Brockport Community. The** housekeeping staff cares for all residence halls and academic, athletic, and administrative buildings. The duties of our staff include the daily cleaning of 1,768,000 square feet of space.

US Census data lists the median size of a single-family house in the Brockport area is about 1,850 square feet. Dividing that number into the

square footage cleaned every day gives us the approximate square footage equal to about 956 houses. Dividing those 956 houses by our 73 staff members shows us that each care for the equivalent of 13 homes.

#### Journalism, Broadcasting, and **Public Relations Professor Featured Speaker at Education** Conference

Orzel made the film to educate and inform people about dementia and let those impacted by dementia know about resources that can help. Journalism and Broadcasting (JRB) major Nia Bradley narrated the documentary, and JRB major Mya Coleman created the still graphics for the film. Orzel's previous medical documentaries have tackled asthma, scleroderma and dyslexia.

#### **Advancement Summary**

The mission of the State University College at Brockport Foundation, Inc. is to seek, secure, and steward philanthropic support to advance SUNY Brockport in its commitment to student success.

#### **Fundraising**

- In 2021-22, despite continuing issues related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Brockport Foundation exceeded its overall fundraising goal for the year, raising \$3,718,649, up 2.99% over FY 20201-21 and 24.1% over 2019-20.
- In terms of giving, the Brockport Foundation achieved 100% participation, as did the President's Cabinet and the College Council.
- A total of 292 individuals or corporate friends made gifts in excess of \$1,000, up 21.2% over the previous year.
- A great need for emergency grant dollars for students emerged when COVID struck, and the Golden Eagle Opportunity Fund (GEOF) was formed. Grants totaling more than \$150,000 have been awarded to 450 students during the past two years.
- A struggling market impacted the Brockport Foundation's endowment during the fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2021. Down more than 11%, total endowed and managed assets held within the portfolio dropped to \$27,194,546, with \$22.15 million strictly within the endowed funds.

#### In addition

- The Brockport Foundation awarded 485 individual scholarships (11% increase) totaling more than \$577,000 (up 19%). For the 2022-23 cycle, scholarship applications increased by nearly 15% to the highest level in three years.
- A total of 123 unique email communications reaching 1,814,602 people were sent throughout the year, with a small "bounce-back" rate of just 0.4%.
- Despite COVID, Alumni Engagement held a scaled-back Homecoming Weekend in fall 2021, one of the few large in-person activities during the pandemic.
- Three volunteers of color were added to help diversify two volunteer boards (one to the Brockport Foundation and two to the Brockport Alumni Association).
- The Office of Giving added 29 new members to our Legacy Society (projected planned gifts) that will add to the sustainability of the Foundation and the institution for years to come. In the previous four years combined, we had "booked" less than 10 planned gifts.
- Another successful audit (performed by The Bonadio Group) as well as upgrades to internal processes and procedures that were welcome during the online work experience for staff were accomplished through the efforts of the Finance and Advancement Services team.
- Through appends, event registrations and alumni updates, Advancement grew the number of active alumni email addresses to more than 59,750.
- Advancement sent 1,876 personal birthday cards to alumni, emeriti, faculty/staff, donors, and friends, up more than 50% since 2015-16.



# Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion

#### Fannie Barrier Williams Scholars Program Developed

In 2022, The Fannie Barrier Williams Scholars program was created to provide four-year scholarships (with the option of a fifth year) to students from low-income families with unmet financial need. Starting fall 2022, approximately 30 students per year will receive these awards, which will supplement existing state and federal programs and cover traditional out-of-pocket expenses such as room and board and fees. Preference will be given to students of color. The program is funded by the ESL Foundation.

## Brown Bag Lunch and Learn Series

The Office of Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion – in coordination with key colleagues from across the institution – implemented a Brown Bag Lunch and Learn Series, which was open to all students, faculty, and staff. Five discussions were held throughout the academic year. Each session was presented by internal experts.

#### **Talon Academy Grows**

The Talon Academy, a men of color leadership, mentorship, and community building effort that

launched in 2020, has grown to include more than 20 students. The program is now sponsoring 3-5 events per semester, including the inaugural Men of Excellence Ceremony. The ceremony honored the hard work, dedication, and resilience of more than a dozen students.

## 2022 Diversity Conference: S.H.I.F.T. Brockport Together!

2022 was the 20th anniversary of the College's Diversity Conference. Running from March 28 through April 1, this year's conference theme was: S.H.I.F.T. (Strength, Hope/Healing, Intentional Inclusion, Family/Friends, Togetherness). The conclusion of the conference was a keynote by Pulitzer-Prize winner Nikole Hannah-Jones, who spoke on the "Truth, History, and The 1619 Project." In between, we held more than 20 presentations and events, including The Homage Exhibit and the International Festival.

#### Lavender and Umoja Ceremonies Held

Two end-of-year ceremonies were held to recognize the accomplishments of our historically underrepresented students. The annual Lavender Ceremony recognized the graduating students in our LGBTQ+ community. The Umoja ceremony recognized the accomplishments of graduating Black, Indigenous, and People of Color students.

## Former Costa Rican President Visits Campus

The 47th President of Costa Rica, Luis Guillermo Solís, came to SUNY Brockport on March 31 to speak with students, faculty, and staff on global topics during the Diversity Conference. President Solís presented "Inclusion and Diversity as Pillars of a Democratic System — A Costa Rican Experience."

## International Festival Celebrates Cultures Around the World

The International Festival returned Spring 2022. Wegmans Food Market offered food tastings from around the world and educational resources. The event also featured a hand-in-script table, henna artists, international flag showcase, and musical performances.

## Students Travel to Atlanta: Golden Eagle Experience

During Spring Break, 18 students traveled to Atlanta, GA with staff members to learn, connect, and offer service. Students explored historical sites, met with a prominent civil rights activist, networked with Atlanta-based alumni, and volunteered at a variety of organizations, including the Atlanta Community Food Bank. Thanks to gifts from donors and support from departments across campus, the trip cost just \$50 for students.

#### **Clothes Closet Updated**

The Clothes Closet, a service offered by the Office of Career Services, was updated to be gender inclusive. The Clothes Closet offers professional clothing to students.

#### **Increasing Accessibility**

The Office of College Communications created an innovative way to ensure event posters on campus are accessible to people with visual impairments. All event posters now contain a QR code that sends a user to an accessible webpage where they can find the poster's text.



## Rochester Educational Opportunity Center

The Rochester EOC's (REOC) mission is to support the underserved population and provide services that lead to increased employability and advanced educational opportunities. REOC serves the greater Rochester and surrounding areas by providing tuition-free, holistic educational services to underserved students who have limited income and resources.

#### **Highlights:**

 The annual REOC Multicultural Celebration, which recognizes and celebrates the diversity of students, faculty, and staff, was held on November 4. President Macpherson and Chief Diversity Officer Damita Davis were in attendance and participated with the students. The special guest for the event was Womba Africa Drumming and Dance — a sensational cultural drum and dance group formed in the town of Nungua, Africa.

- January 18 marked REOC's
   annual Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King
   Celebration. The special guest at
   the celebration was Ambassador
   Andrew Young, Jr. who talked to
   the audience about the importance
   of being inclusive and working
   collectively to make a positive
   impact in this country.
- The REOC has been the leading force in SUNY for All efforts, www.suny.edu/sunyforall.
   REOC offered six asynchronous programs through the SUNY for All initiative: Teacher Assistant, Child Development Associate, Customer Service/Call Center, Civil Service Exam Preparation, Emergency Telecommunications,

- and Pre-Vocational Studies. Last year, Google IT was a new initiative and enrollment has been strong with these new programming and delivery initiatives. Over 90% of all SUNY for All students located anywhere in New York are educated at the REOC.
- REOC Dean/Executive Director
   Roosevelt Mareus was selected by
   the editorial staff of the Rochester
   Business Journal as one of
   Rochester's power players in the
   higher education industry for its
   Power 30 List. All selected power
   players were profiled in a special
   section in print and online.

#### **New Mentorship Program**

Twenty-nine students were assigned mentors from REOC staff, faculty as well as community members. Students received guidance in goal setting, networking, motivation, and career exploration. They also received assistance in identifying resources.

#### **Graduation/Staff Appreciation**

REOC held two graduation ceremonies to accommodate an onsite celebration on June 7, 2022. Approximately 700 graduates, staff, family members, and friends were in attendance. Assemblymember Demond Meeks addressed the students at the ceremony.

Staff and faculty were also celebrated on June 7 and applauded for their hard work and efforts. President Macpherson and Ms. Lisa Jackson of the University Center for Academic and Workforce Development, attended both events.

#### **SNAP Grant**

REOC was awarded the new 5-year Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) grant, which will allow the continuance of offering food and educational resources to qualified students. REOC's SNAP grant played a key role for REOC and the student community throughout the pandemic. The SNAP team served over 40% of our enrolled population during the 2020-2021 academic year and helped to prevent food insecurity through a variety of supportive services.

#### **Partnerships Forged**

REOC continued to seek collaborations within the community in order to expand program offerings and to increase supportive services for our students. Some of these new partnerships include:

- The Evening School Partnership between REOC and the Edison Tech Campus. As a result of this partnership, REOC will be able to offer Precision Machining, Auto Technician, Optics and Construction programs.
- REOC partnered with the New York State Department of Health and became a NYS COVID-19 vaccination site. The REOC site provided 18,768 vaccinations to members of the community.





- REOC is a member of the Rochester Community Consortium Partnership Symposium, which is an initiative pertaining to employment opportunities and violence prevention.
- REOC continued the partnership with the Shore Foundation, which allowed distribution of refurbished computers to REOC students in need. This partnership ensured that students were successful in all REOC programs (both on-site and online) throughout the 2021-2022 academic year.



 REOC was an official Polling Place for the Monroe County Board of Elections Primary Election. The June 28, 2022 Primary event provided a great opportunity for REOC to encourage students and staff to register to vote.

#### Athletic Achievements

- In 2021-22, Golden Eagles athletics produced 22 All-American's, 83 All-Region selections and an incredible 109 All-Conference selections. Two of our teams earned a spot in the coveted National Tournament and 16 individual studentathletes qualified for the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championships. Brockport earned an Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Bowl Game title as well as a **National Collegiate Gymnastics** Association (NCGA) East Regional Championship.
- Our programs produced 15
  major individual conference
  award winners, including seven
  Conference Players of the Year.
  Eight of our teams were nationally
  ranked throughout the year and
  seven of our programs qualified
  for their respective conference
  tournament.
- Brockport's athletic staff hosted several major events on campus including:
  - State University of New York Athletic Conference Indoor & Outdoor Track & Field Championships
  - NCAA Division III Baseball Championship Regional
  - SUNYAC Women's Lacrosse Tournament Quarterfinals
  - SUNYAC Men's Basketball Tournament Quarterfinals
  - SUNYAC Volleyball Tournament Quarterfinals
  - · ECAC Football Bowl Game
- More than 250 student-athletes were named to SUNYAC Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll after completing the Spring semester with a cumulative 3.3+ GPA.

- · On March 3, 2022, family, friends, staff, faculty, students, and alumni from across the globe came together to raise \$96,793.85 in gifts to SUNY Brockport Athletics as part of the "Go Big For Brockport" Day of Giving challenge. The gifts came from a record 1,112 donors. Some of the highlights of the day of giving included the baseball program raising \$25,917.58 as well as the football program raising \$22,135.07. The gymnastics program raised \$6,723.61 and the men's soccer team raised \$4,767.86. Thirteen programs raised over \$1,000.
- Brockport baseball capped its 2022 campaign just one win shy of the school record as the Golden Eagles finished with a 33-11 overall record and earned an atlarge bid into the NCAA Division III Championships. Brockport earned the right to host an NCAA Regional for the first time in program history.
- The gymnastics program
  finished as the runner-up at
  the (NCGA) Division III National
  Championships. Senior Lexi
  Castellaneta was named the
  NCGA Most Outstanding Senior,
  recognizing her as the top
  gymnast in Division III. The 2022
  Golden Eagles were the first team
  in program history to finish the
  regular season with an undefeated
  record (15-0).
- Brockport hockey made an appearance in the SUNYAC Conference Tournament Semifinals for the first time since 2015 and senior Ryan Romeo earned SUNYAC Conference Player of the Year and first team All-American honors.
- The track & field program had another excellent indoor and outdoor season. Junior Sarah Crocket was named the SUNYAC Female Field Athlete of the Year and senior Art Jordan was named the SUNYAC Male Field Athlete of the Year. Crockett earned her first career All-American honor at indoor nationals.

- The men's basketball program made their eighth consecutive trip to the SUNYAC Semifinals and their 21st straight trip to the conference tournament.
- Brockport football hosted and won the 2021 ECAC Scotty Whitelaw Bowl, while Josh Greenwood and Allan Montgomery were each named All-Americans.
- The men's lacrosse team posted the second most wins in program history and advanced to the SUNYAC Tournament semifinals. The Golden Eagles had a schoolrecord five student-athletes earn All-American honors.
- The women's lacrosse program was ranked nationally for the majority of the year and earned another spot in the SUNYAC Conference Tournament semifinals. Senior goalie Morgan Elmer earned her second straight All-American honor for the Golden Eagles.
- Brockport volleyball earned a spot in the SUNYAC Tournament semifinals and two studentathletes were named All-Americans.
- Brockport wrestling sent two wrestlers, Zach Levey and Matt Caccamise, to the NCAAs this past season and interim Head Coach Bill Jacoutot was named the NCAA Division III Wrestling Rookie Coach of the Year at nationals.
- Cross country student-athletes Ethan Carey and Kerry Flower both qualified for the NCAA Division III Cross Country Championships.
- Swimmer Elizabeth Sagan was recognized as the SUNYAC Rookie of the Year. She was the individual event champion in the 50 (23.97) and 100-yard freestyle (52.44) events at the SUNYAC championship.


